Activity	Sponsorship of Junior Achievement/Youth Achievement Foundation, Inc. The mission of YAF Inc. is "to enhance the economic development of our community by supporting programs and activities that inspire and prepare young people to succeed in a global economy". YAF inc communicates the value of the Junior Achievement Educational Program to the teachers in the school system, recruits volunteers to teach the classes, and raises funds for the program. Everybody who works to support the JA program in YAF Inc. is a volunteer. There is no paid staff. The Junior Achievement program has been in Cumberland County schools since the 2009-2010 school year. In the 2012-2013 school year, almost 600 students in grades K-12 will benefit from the Junior Achievement Program in their classrooms and about 500 students will have the experience of going to Biztown to run their business.
Tasks	The YAF 5 year goal is to provide a JA program to all students in Cumberland County schools at least four times during their academic career. The cost to do that is about \$30,000/yr. With the current fundralsing capacity, they have raised \$12,000. With additional funding, 3rd grade students could be offered a program titled, "Our City" which introduces students to the concepts of how cities are organized and run, how to start up a restaurant, or be a newspaper reporter, etc. Also with additional funding, more 5th grade students could attend Biztown and 7th grade students would be introduced to "Economics for Success" program. This program teaches students about skills, interests, and values and how that relates to careers in the world of work. They also learn about the relationship between education and earnings, managing a family budget, buying with cash vs. credit, the importance of credit scores, and managing financial risk. Additional funding would also allow two additional high school programs, "Being Entrepreneurial" and "Corporate Program". These two programs allow students to design a product, raise operating funds, produce and sell the product and pay off their investors. YAF Inc. is currently reaching about 1,100 students per year with the Junior Achievement program. With a fully funded program, this could be increased to 2,500. Each \$1,000 of additional funding will provide programming for about 100 more students per year.

	Describe in detail an activity your county will implement to address and improve one or more of the Governor's Pillars.
Activity	Based on data received from the TN Department of Safety, Cumberland County ranks 15th in 15-24 year old drivers involved in crashes. An increase in young driver crashes have been on an upward trend since 2008 with a peak rate at this time. The presence of two high schools and a local college within the jurisdiction and the ability to affect those drivers is a priority. The Crossville Police Department would like to reduce the number of young driver related crashes by 10% from 549 (2010) to 499 by the end of December 2013. The department would use a series of saturation zones within areas where young driver crashes occurred at specific times. The Crossville Police Department believes that increased enforcement along with visibility will educate the drivers and the public in general on the commitment to reducing the young driver crashes. The use of various media outlets, saturation patrols community projects and presentations to ensure the public of the commitment and need for constant evaluation to decrease young driver crashes. The Police Department would use full time, certified, currently employed officers. The JECDB has agreed to support this endeavour with a \$2,500 donation to go toward police officer payroll expenses.
Tasks	Crossville Police Department would target those drivers who are driving during peak times of 7-10 a.m. and 5-8 p.m. weekdays with additional saturations on weekends from 10 a.m2 p.m. on city and rural roads. Those drivers 15-24 years of age encountered will be the primary target during these peak hours at pre-designated crash zones based on departmental crash data within the Titan Accident System and Map It System. A laptop will be used to track crashes using Titan Accident Software system to include Map It Software, citations issued during saturation patrols, speed related crashes and to analyze data.

Detailed description and specific cost of project, program, process, and/or service identified in the ThreeStar Activity Plan.

The YAF five year goal is to provide a JA program to all students in Cumberland County schools at least four times during their academic career and Cumberland County JECDB would like to help the group achieve this goal by focusing on the Junior Achievement classroom program. The cost to do that is about \$30,000/year using community volunteers. With the current fundraising capacity, YAF is raising \$12,000/year. The first exposure to Junior Achievement would be in the 3rd grade. Second exposure would be in the 5th grade. Third exposure would be in the 7th grade and then final exposure in high school.

In 3rd grade, the curriculum includes a segment on how cities are planned and organized. The second segment is about construction. The students have the opportunity to put buildings together and decide where in their city that each building would appropriately be placed. In the third session, they learn about opening a restaurant. They are given information about various decisions that they will have to make and then in groups of 3-4 decide what kind of restaurant they will open, where it will be located, pricing, employees, and marketing strategies. In the fourth session, they learn about being a newspaper reporter. They review the 5 "W's" of a good newspaper article and prepare an outline. In the fifth session, they are given a payroll check, open a checking account, and get a debit card. They are taught about balancing a checkbook and keeping a checkbook register. These are all valuable lessons that make great citizens.

In the 5th grade, students attend Biztown to experience running a business and working their job in the business. They determine operating budget, get a business operating loan from the bank, make payroll, and pay other operating expenses, set pricing for their products, etc. Their goal for the day will be to pay-off their business loan. They will experience all of the responsibilities of having a job or running a business and what they like about their job, which will help them in making decisions about how they will prepare themselves for the future.

In the 7th grade, the "Economics for Success" program would be offered. In that curriculum, students learn about their skills, interests, and values and how it relates to careers in the world of work. They learn about the relationship between education and earnings, managing a family budget, buying with cash vs. credit, the importance of credit scores, and managing financial risk.

High schoolers are exposed to the "Being Entrepreneurial" and "Corporate" programs. Students design a product, raise operating funds, produce and sell the product and pay off their investors. This is a critical component to developing entrepreneurs and developing a strong economic community base.

\$5,000 would be given to YAF/Junior Achievement to offer these programs.

Policy Statement

TREASURER'S REPORT

Chairman Rimmer gave the treasurer's report. The balance is \$1,022.37, gaining 0.13 interest since the last report.

REPRESENTATIVE REPORTS

Mayor Graham reported that the City was approached in July by CoLinx about purchasing the City's property on Woodlawn Road; however, the company has decided to add on to its existing facility. This addition will allow them to hire 25-60 more full time employees. In July 2009, CoLinx had 426 employees and as of May 2012, there were 769 employees.

In October, TLD Logistics contacted the City about purchasing 5½ acres in the Interchange Park. The City Council authorized the City Manager to negotiate with them and that process is still ongoing.

City Manager Bruce Wyatt reported that the City is fully cooperating with CoLinx on its expansion and assisting CoLinx and its engineering firm, ECE, in any way he can.

Brad Fox stated he's happy to be serving on the JECDB as chair of the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors. He replaces Frank Shipley. He also stated his appreciation for everyone in the room that has always been supportive of the Chamber of Commerce. He announced several reports that came out recently that are now available at the Chamber of Commerce office: New Strategic Retail Plan, Tourism report, Beacon Center report (Crossville jumped from #23 to #17), and the Labor Benefits Survey.

Brad also announced:

- Leadership Cumberland is about to kick off next month and there are still 2 spots available if anyone is interested.
- Chamber representatives will be attending 10 golf shows next year
- Chamber representatives will be attending trade shows in the Northeast to attract retirees to move to Crossville
- Legislative Breakfast January 7, 7:30 a.m. at Crossville Housing Authority

 Shop Crossville First very successful once again this year with 10 corporate sponsors

Chairman Rimmer is asking the board to be thinking of a replacement for Robert Muckler, the community member at large representative. Mr. Muckler has moved to Ohio.

Gregg Upchurch would like for the JECDB to consider supporting his initiative to get the the county to be on daylight savings time year round. He feels this would help the farmers and also improve the economy as he feels it would encourage residents to shop more due to having more daylight hours.

Gregg explained that the bean farmers are in need of crop insurance to help offset their losses in years where drought is experienced. His organization is working toward documenting weather conditions to be able to get crop insurance in place. He stated it's a long process and started too late last year but it ahead of the game this year.

City/County Ventures

Chairman Rimmer reported that the bids on the Big South Fork Visitor's Center have been received for the 3rd time. The low bidder was W&O Construction at \$604,000. Carmin Lynch pointed out that this bid is with zero contingency and that the granting agencies will not accept any more bids. If the process fails with this bid, the granting agencies will retract the available grant money. The bid has been submitted to the architect and the County is currently awaiting approval.

As reported previously, there are additional costs:

•	Advertising (bid 3 different times)	\$ 4,691.97
•	Civil Engineering Design Fee-Upland Design Group	\$ 4,100.00
•	Construction Engineering & Inspection (CEI Services)	\$ 24,710.00

Mr. Lynch stated the specs were changed prior to sending the bid documents out. City Manager Wyatt stated he was unaware the specs had been changed.

New business

Carmin Lynch inquired to the board why Crossville/Cumberland County was not able to lure the tile plant that just recently announced opening a facility in Loudon County. Beth Alexander from the Chamber replied that Loudon County had been working with the said company for 4 years and there were other restrictions that affected their decision, which she could not discuss. Mayor Graham and City Manager Bruce Wyatt both stated they knew nothing about the company.

Mayor Graham made a motion to adjourn. Gregg Upchurch seconded. Motion carried on voice vote.

Sean Stephens gave the treasurer's report. The balance is \$1,022.50, gaining 0.13 interest since the last report.

CITY OF CROSSVILLE MAYOR J.H. GRAHAM

Mayor Graham reported that he has been helping CoLinx pursue Fast Track & TDOT access road grants from the State of Tennessee to assist with a proposed expansion:

- 210,000 square feet warehouse expansion
- Loading dock
- Redesign of site storm water drainage system
- Redesign of plant access road along Cox Avenue

The City is asking the County to join them in this effort by actually being the applicant because the County can receive more in grant money than the City (36% as opposed to 25%). The City is asking the County to simply receive & distribute the grant funds, if the grant is approved. In return, the City would complete the application, initiate the bid process, receive the bids, and oversee the project. This will create 65 jobs.

Mayor Graham also reported that Flowers Bakery has benefitted from the recent bankruptcy of a major baking company. They have been able to hire 100 employees within the last month.

CUMBERLAND COUNTY MAYOR KENNETH CAREY

Mayor Carey asked for the JECDB to approve and recommend the CoLinx project to the County Commission.

Bobby Randolph made a motion for the JECDB to support the project. Mayor Carey seconded the motion.

Commissioner Lynch inquired about the specifics of the project. Chuck Burgess and Ed Camera gave an overview. Commissioner Lynch also inquired if ECD supported this project. Mayor Carey assured him they did and had talked to them several times. Motion carried on voice vote.

CITY MANAGER BRUCE WYATT

Mr. Wyatt commended the City and County for working together on the CoLinx project and reported that the deal commits CoLinx to staying in Crossville until 2027. The current contract is set to expire in 2017.

TLD Logistics, a trucking company, has submitted a letter of intent to purchase 5½ acres in the Interchange Park, which adjoins their current facility. This will allow the company to expand and add 25 jobs. TLD will be spending \$500,000 to build a facility (minimum 10,000 square feet) for the servicing of their trucks. David Jones, TLD Logistics, will be attending the City Council meeting on February 12, 2013 to meet and address the Council to answer any questions the Council might have.

Commissioner Lynch asked if any incentive requests are anticipated from CoLinx or TLD Logistics. Mayor Carey and City Manager Wyatt agreed that CoLinx would be asking for a PILOT. City Manager Wyatt stated that no incentive requests are anticipated from TLD Logistics.

JERRY WOOD, CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

- Houchens Industries has leased the Food Lion building to open Priceless Foods.
 They anticipate providing 60 jobs, opening in April 2013. A job fair will be held in March.
- Leadership Cumberland program kicked off February 6 with a full class.
- Chamber attended IDEA living shows in New York, Chicago, Pennsylvania. There are upcoming shows in Virginia, New Jersey, and Pittsburgh.
- Business After Hours will be held March 14, 2013 at Crossville Housing Authority.

BRAD FOX, CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Beth Alexander has turned in letter of resignation that will become effective February 28, 2013. The Executive Committee of the Chamber has begun the process of hiring a President/CEO. A job description has been written and the position will be advertised locally and with the Tennessee Chamber Network until February 22, 2013. The goal is to have a candidate selected by June 1, 2013 and beginning on July 1, 2013.

Brad advised that the Executive Committee of the board has the authority to hire the President/CEO. Bobby Randolph stated he feels it is important that the City and County officials be involved in the hiring process.

BOBBY RANDOLPH, VOLUNTEER ENERGY COOPERATIVE

VEC is doing an upgrade at the Lantana substation, Taylor's Chapel, and Fairfield Glade. VEC has received notification from the Department of Transportation that the Peavine Road project bid letting will occur in July and that the poles on Peavine Road need to be relocated. There are three proposed routes:

- The northern route, which will travel behind Stone Lake and Fox Creek
- Behind Stone Lake and Fox Creek and turning at Turner Lake
- Chestnut Hill Area, (VEC's preferred method but probably too expensive)

Not changing circuit from Weigel's to VEC substation.

CITY/COUNTY VENTURES

Per Mayor Carey, plans and bids have been submitted to TDOT awaiting approval.

THREE STAR ACTIVITY PLAN

Chairman Rimmer explained changes in the Three Star program and discussed the pillars that have been established by the Department of Economic and Community Development. Chairman Rimmer also explained that a project is now required in order to be a Three Star Community. Only Three Star communities are eligible for CDBG and Fast Track grant applications. Cumberland County is a tier 2 community and eligible for a \$7,500 grant (no match required). Brad Fox presented the idea of sponsoring the Junior Achievement program. The program currently serves 600 students in Cumberland County. The program's mission is to enhance the economic development of the community by supporting programs and activities that inspire and prepare young people to succeed in a global economy, using the school system as its avenue to pursue this mission. The program could add new programs and serve an additional 100 students per \$1,000. Chairman Rimmer asked Valerie to explain a program the Crossville Police Department wishes to fund. Due to Cumberland County ranking 15th in the state in young driver crashes, they have proposed the idea of saturation checkpoints in the high school zones to promote safety and check for seat belt usage during peak times. Their goal is to reduce the number of young driver related crashes by 10% by the end of December 2013. A minimum of 3 saturation patrols per month will enable the police department to affect this decrease. The Crossville Police Department is applying for grants to several agencies to fund this program.

Mayor Carey made a motion to apply for the Three Star grant requesting \$5,000 for the Junior Achievement Program and \$2,500 for the Young Driver Crash Prevention Program. Motion was seconded by Gregg Upchurch. Motion carried on voice vote.
