#### KCSV Airport Committee Meeting FBO Report: Monday October 2, 2023

August 2023 Fuel Flow:

Jet A- 6,953 Avgas- 3,307 Total- 10,260 gallons

September 2022 Fuel Flow:

Down about 2000 gallons from last month and from same month last year. Avgas was up over last month due to the Airport Open House. Titan Aviation Fuels has reported fuel numbers are down for our entire region. Our number one Jet fuel-based customer has their aircraft out for maintenance so that reflects in less than normal Jet A sales volume

We had a good month in flight training and rental with a system wide total of 336 hours which was up from 270 hours in August.

We are in the process of transitioning flight training operations to Tennessee Flight Training (TFT) so we can focus our efforts on the Part 135 charter business. This transition will be good for Crossville since TFT is solely focused on flight training and will work with Azure to elevate the flight training business to the next level.

On September 15 we closed on the purchase of Carrier Airways, LLC, a part 135 aircraft charter company located in Portsmouth NH. Over the next six months we will move operations of the current fleet to Tennessee and start adding Tennessee based aircraft to the fleet. We anticipate the fleet being up to 5 in Tennessee within the next 12 months including jet and turboprop aircraft. We would like to expand maintenance in Crossville to maintain the charter fleet for scheduled phase maintenance. This would grow our maintenance shop significantly adding the ability to maintain turbine aircraft.

The Maintenance Shop is completely full with a backlog of work and we anticipate it to stay that way. We currently have two of the Crossville mechanics in Lawrence MA getting trained for Part 135 maintenance operations and assisting on inspections for one of the aircraft we acquired when we purchased the charter company.

## 2023 Crossville Airport Open House/Fly-in After Action Comments

Overall: Thanks to everyone for a great event. The weather was excellent, we had good crowds, all invited aircraft except for the L-39 and L-29 (cancelled due to maintenance problems) arrived and displayed properly. I have no estimates of attendance, guesses ranged from several hundred to around 5,000. Compliments from the crowd were constant.

Major Kudos to Gwen Schallow for recruiting and monitoring the crowd control volunteers, who designed and put together the outstanding "swag bags" for volunteers, gave information, helped visitors with anything/everything, and who worked tirelessly to make the event a success. Overheard from a volunteer, "Wow! What a swag bag!" There are a lot of additional Kudos for Gwen, the 24" X 36" aircraft posters in the "A" frames at each static aircraft, the gift packages for each static aircrew, the signage that was everywhere to inform, guide and direct our guests to anything they needed, the color hand-outs that were given to the guests and her can-do attitude with almost instant request results.

Kudos to the Queens! Kudos to Connie Clapper for a super job organizing the Queens to manage the lunchroom and making the event look a little classier. No other event features the Queens, and the Queens are a signature part of the Crossville Airport Open House.

Kudos to Greg Wood our City Manager. His total emersion in this event and dedication to its success is evident. Greg is the guy who writes the checks and coordinates everything with the city and the departments that are essential to our success. Think Fire, Police, EMT, potable barriers, barrier roping, food trucks, porta potties, lunch contracts, bottled water, printing, advertising, transportation from and to parking to name just a few. Greg Wood is an airport and aviation advocate and the reason this event is successful.

Kudos to Azure Flight Support, especially Greg Livingston and Johnna McCoy. Greg is the go-to guy for virtually any question and/or problem. He is the wrangler that keeps the herd moving. He never stopped moving and never complained. Johnna and her crew ran the most incredible efficient fueling operation. The jewel in her crown of Open House accomplishments is her plan and implementation of fueling the nine-ship formation of Swift aircraft after their three fly overs and peel-off landing. Good Job Johnna!

### Specifics:

Rides: The aircraft rides were handled in the most efficient and professional manner to date. The use of portable barriers to segregate the ride area from the rest of the ramp

increased safety and allowed ride participants secure access while keeping strolling visitors from inadvertently walking into the path of taxiing aircraft. Kudos to Gwen Schallow for coming up with the idea and to Greg Wood for making it happen. Kudos to George Paulisin. The rides have been George's baby from day one and he personally built the stanchion and rope barriers that guide the riders safely to and from their aircraft. Big Thanks to George!

Hot Zone and Cold Zone: Promoted successfully by Greg Livingston, and expertly executed by Wayne Baker and Mike Schallow, the concept of a cold area for static display aircraft and unfettered visitor accesses apart from the hot area where flying aircraft would be parked with monitored public access worked as planned and anticipated. Kudos to Wayne and Mike for the professionalism of the marshalling people and their management of the crowd control volunteers during the many engine starts and taxiing of the T-6, T-28's and DC-3. Excellent job!

Cold Zone: The marshalling and crowd control people were efficient, prompt and professional, positioning the static displays so that all aircraft could be presented to the public uncrowded with room to walk around the airplanes. Crowd control and marshalling personnel were quick to move portable barriers to facilitate taxiing aircraft safe lanes to their parking spot. Unique fly-in aircraft were quickly identified and directed to the display area instead of the transient parking area. The decision to move the T-28's from the ramp's edge to the middle of the ramp facing East increased the public awareness and interest in these combat veterans. Kudos again to Wayne, Mike and their crew.

Hot Zone: The positioning of the DC-3 and T-6 on either side of the taxiway entrance to the ramp was extremely effective. The safety factor was enhanced by the elimination of either aircraft needing to taxi thru the crowd to access the runway. As expected, the marshalling crew of Wayne and mike efficiently guided the transient aircraft to easily accessible parking spots and in a similar fashion guided those who left early safely out to the taxiway for departure.

Miscellaneous: The Swift Museum Foundation Annual Fly-in coincided with our Open House and agreed to participate in our event with a formation fly-over. Our expectations were exceeded when they appeared with a nine-ship formation that gave us three flyovers from different directions and then did an overhead formation peel off for landing. Johnna's plan for fueling the Swifts on the compass rose was genius and in short order the Swifts made another impression on the crowd as they departed with a series of two ship formation take-offs.

T-6 "Checkers" asked to come back next year. The T-6 flew several paying customers and entertained the crowd with low passes andg3 smoke.

Finally, I rate this open house as one of our best. All the participating aircraft indicated that they would like to return. Visitor comments were all positive, parking seemed to be adequate and efficient. The hay wagons seem to have kept up with the demand, with some lines at the end of the day. There were enough trash bins to eliminate litter. Thanks to Gary Moore for keeping the water cart circulating through the crown so no one suffered from heat stroke.

Thanks to everyone for all your help and support, we can all feel good about a job well done,
